

## The Jungle John Milton

A brand new series of sound-button board books which combines gorgeous illustrations with six high-quality sounds.

Little ones can join in the fun On the Farm by pulling out the sliders, jiggling the animals, and making all the different noises! Quack along with the ducks, moo with the cows, and neigh with the horses. Children will love playing with this bright and colorful board book with gentle rhyming text and beautifully illustrated by the award-winning Axel Scheffler.

This lavish and beautiful gift book contains Rudyard Kipling’s best loved animal stories, The Jungle Book and The Second Jungle Book, the bonus story The Cat That Walked by Himself, Kipling’s most famous poem, If, and biographical information about Kipling. A final chapter features rare images of memorabilia from the Macmillan Kipling archive. Macmillan published the first edition of The Jungle Book in 1894 and remained Kipling’s primary publisher his whole life. The Complete Jungle Book includes many illustrations by Stuart Tresilian, who illustrated these titles for Macmillan in the 1930s, in black line and the book also includes many full colour illustrations.

Adapted from the stories by Rudyard Kipling, Mowgli, the “man-cub,” lost in the jungle, is rescued from the clutches of the fearsome tiger, Shere Khan, by Baloo the bear and Bagheera the black panther. Brought up with a family of wolf-cubs, the time eventually comes for Mowgli to return to the world of Man. But Mowgli is not finished with the jungle, for one day he returns to settle the score with Shere Khan...

These are pieces to stimulate the musical imagination with such titles as "Snake Sneaking" and "Jungle River Flowing." They are also studies for dynamic balance between the hands, soft tone production, "finger-pedal" (sustaining tones with fingers instead of with pedal), and more. Jon George's illustrations add to the attractiveness.

*On February 13, 2003, a plane carrying three American military contractors crash-landed in the jungle-covered mountains of Colombia. *The Jungle is a 1906 novel written by the American journalist and novelist Upton Sinclair (1878–1968). Sinclair wrote the novel to portray the lives of immigrants in the United States in Chicago and similar industrialized cities. Many readers were most concerned with his exposure of health violations and unsanitary practices in the American meatpacking industry during the early 20th century, based on an investigation he did for a socialist newspaper. The book depicts working class poverty, the lack of social supports, harsh and unpleasant living and working conditions, and a hopelessness among many workers. These elements are contrasted with the deeply rooted corruption of people in power. A review by the writer Jack London called it, "the Uncle Tom's Cabin of wage slavery." Sinclair was considered a muckraker, or journalist who exposed corruption in government and business. He first published the novel in serial form in 1905 in the Socialist newspaper, Appeal to Reason, between February 25, 1905, and November 4, 1905. In 1904, Sinclair had spent seven weeks gathering information while working incognito in the meatpacking plants of the Chicago stockyards for the newspaper. It was published as a book on February 26, 1906 by Doubleday and in a subscribers' edition.*

First published serially between 1893 and 1894, "The Jungle Book" is Rudyard Kipling's classic collection of jungle tales in which we first meet Mowgli, a child lost in the jungles of India and raised by a pack of wolves. To survive in the jungle Mowgli most learn from the animals to abide by the laws of the jungle. A cast of interesting creatures surround Mowgli, including Baloo the bear and Bagheera the black panther, who help the young man to survive, and the tiger Shere Khan, who is envious of Mowgli and wishes his demise. Also contained in this collection are the stories of Kotick, a white seal in search of a new home for his tribe were they will not be hunted, and Rikki-Tikki-Tavi, a mongoose who defends an Indian family against a pair of cobras. Several other tales of the jungle grace this collection which is interspersed with beautiful poetry relating to the stories. One of the most popular collections of short stories for children ever written, "The Jungle Book" was inspired by Kipling's own experiences as a youth in India, where he would spend many of his formative years. This edition is printed on premium acid-free paper and includes illustrations by John L. Kipling, William H. Drake, and Paul Frenzeny.

The Second Jungle Book is a sequel to The Jungle Book by Rudyard Kipling. First published in 1895, it features five stories about Mowgli and three unrelated stories, all but one set in India, most of which Kipling wrote while living in Vermont. All of the stories were previously published in magazines in 1894-5, often under different titles. The original book is now worth \$3.4 million.

The 1994 film The Jungle Book used this book as a source. Each story is followed by a related poem.

A searing novel of social realism, Upton Sinclair's The Jungle follows the fortunes of Jurgis Rukkus, an immigrant who finds in the stockyards of turn-of-the-century Chicago a ruthless system that degrades and impoverishes him, and an industry whose filthy practices contaminate the meat it processes. From the stench of the killing-beds to the horrors of the fertilizer-works, the appalling conditions in which Jurgis works are described in intense detail by an author bent on social reform. So powerful was the book's message that it caught the eye of President Theodore Roosevelt and led to changes to the food hygiene laws. In his introduction to this new edition, Russ Castronovo highlights the aesthetic concerns that were central to Sinclair's aspirations, examining the relationship between history and historical fiction, and between the documentary impulse and literary narrative. As he examines the book's disputed status as novel (it is propaganda or literature?), he reveals why Sinclair's message-driven fiction has relevance to literary and historical matters today, now more than a hundred years after the novel first appeared in print.

"This book is an absorbing and detailed account of eighteen months spent on the Burma frontier very often behind enemy lines and always in appalling jungle conditions. The author, as an officer with a secret and irregular military unit called V Force, was parachuted into the hills above the Siamese frontier with Force 136 (a branch of the Special Operations Executive) and his task was to organise local resistance groups to harass the Japanese. He vividly recaptures the rigours of jungle warfare with small groups of guerillas when weeks at a time were spent away from base camp beset by leeches, jungle sores and monsoon rainfall. This is not a book about large scale operations but rather about daring skirmishes and ambushes carried out in wild and enemy-held country."
